


A YEAR OF GROWTH AND POSITIVE IMPACT

As we reflect on the past year, we are proud to celebrate the growth and impact made possible by the volunteer efforts of CHG employees and medical providers. Their generosity and passion have touched lives, strengthened communities, and supported important causes in 2024.

Volunteering is more vital than ever. Studies show that volunteering bridges divides, reduces bias, and improves physical health. CHG employees and medical providers have embraced this call to action, making a meaningful difference through their service.

In 2024, we partnered with 150 nonprofits where employees volunteered their time and talents, supported over 100 medical providers in delivering care to underserved communities, and contributed more than \$875,000 to nonprofits. Our humanitarian efforts included \$95,000 for disaster relief and \$125,000 for free clinics addressing critical healthcare needs.

This year also marked the launch of our five-year strategic plan, centered on three key areas:



CHG employees are deeply committed to giving back and making a positive impact. John Bonney, a Senior Sales Consultant at Weatherby Healthcare, led a meal packing event with his division in North Carolina just before the Thanksgiving holiday. In partnership with the nonprofit organization, Rise Against Hunger, over 70 volunteers worked together and packed an incredible 15,000 meals for those in need.

"There was music, teamwork, friendly competition, and a giant gong to ring for every 1,000 meals packed." John said. "Giving people the opportunity to volunteer without having to leave the office removed the typical barrier to entry and helped to make it a huge success." Building on this momentum, John went a step further and applied for a \$2,500 Divisional Grant from the Making a Difference Foundation. This donation goes directly to help further support Rise Against Hunger's mission and amplifies the volunteer passions of CHG employees.



TEAM VTO GRANTS

Last year, 8 teams from the Marketing and Consumer Products Division received Team VTO Grants from the Making a Difference Foundation to support the Youth Resource Center in Salt Lake City. These volunteer teams provide and serve food to more than 50 individuals living in the center.

Reflecting on her experience volunteering, Brooke Ramirez said, "While each of the kids has their own unique backstory, it's clear that they've all experienced severe trauma in their lives. Nonetheless, they're always super polite and very appreciative that we're there serving them a hot, fresh, healthy meal in the morning, which makes the experience rewarding for our team."



HIGHLIGHTED TRIP GRANTS

In 2024, the Making a Difference Foundation partnered with International Medical Relief on a Highlighted Trip to Poland. The foundation provided grants to 10 medical volunteers who traveled across the world to care for Ukrainians displaced by war.

Anne Foster, an OBGYN from New Mexico, shared her experience on the trip. "Over the past 3 years, this patient population has suffered significant disruption in their healthcare due to war, the COVID pandemic, and relocation/displacement." Fortunately, this small team of volunteers made a big impact for the patients they treated.

"The opportunity to provide medical care and support to those affected by the conflict has reinforced my commitment to humanitarian work." said Dawn Biery, a volunteer nurse. "The resilience and gratitude of the Ukrainians we served were profoundly moving, and I am honored to have been a part of their journey toward healing and hope."



DISASTER RELIEF GRANTS

On September 26, 2024, Hurricane Helene made landfall in the southeastern United States severely impacting Florida and North Carolina. Just two weeks later, on October 9, Hurricane Milton swept through Florida. These natural disasters displaced families, damaged infrastructure, and disrupted entire communities.

Through its Disaster Relief program, the Making a Difference Foundation provided support to impacted communities. The foundation vetted several nonprofit organizations and directed \$40,000 to organizations that were providing essential resources such as shelter, food, healthcare supplies, and other forms of long-term support.

Disaster recovery is often a long process that requires years of effort and hard work. Because of this, the foundation also prioritized the ongoing support of areas affected by previous disasters. In addition to donations made in 2023, the Making a Difference Foundation sent another \$50,000 to support recovery efforts benefiting communities impacted by the Hawaii Wildfires, the Ukraine War, and the conflict in the Middle East.
